I'm proud that many of our special projects are charitable. All of them run smoothly and meet the needs and schedules of the projects. Bow Tie Inserts to Bridge a Gap Gordon Fowler

Gordon showed us a method to cut the butterfly inserts with a hand router using a template. Then he inserted the butterfly with the bowl on the lathe. You can make your own templates from wood, Masonite, or whatever. He bought a template (\$20) from:

Your editor found a YouTube Video by John Maleki: *How to Create a Woodworking Bowtie with a Router* (flatwork).

The following images illustrate the steps in Gordon's process:



TEMPLATE



ROUTER TEMPLATE GUIDE



Template taped on wood in direction of long grain



Cut insert with the router following the template by touch



Gordon illustrated on a bowl –a recess for the butterfly & holding the template in place with hot glue



Here he is cutting the recess on a bowl. He hot glues the template to the bowl & cuts with the router. He used a chisle to make the corners sharp –straight in and levering out the corner.



Inserting the bowtie & gluing it in. After it dries, he sands to close to the bowl's surface before returning the outside. The bow tie should not be visible from the inside because it needs strength of the bottom of the recess to achieve its purpose: holding the crack together.



Gordon's finished bowl -Bravo !

Safety Minute--Dick Hoffmann

Bed Maintenance

- Make sure you lathe's bed allows smooth movement of the banjo & tail stock.
- If needed, sand with high grit (400-800) wet dry sandpaper lubricated with WD-40.
- Wax the bed once smooth



Tool Rest Maintenance

- Any nicks or bump in your tool rest can cause problems (catches or poor cuts)
- Inspect you rest regularly by feeling the top edge
- Use a file to clean up the contact point.
- Add a little wax to help the tool glide smoothly.
