PLATTER WITH A DEMONSTRATOR – CROTCH



Gordon Fowler shared what he has learned from making bowls and platters from crotch wood. He usually cuts the log in two using a chainsaw down the center of the three piths. The best flame pattern is in the center of the log, so the top of the bowl or platter should be on the bark side of the log. As you remove wood from the bark side, you reveal more and more of the flame pattern.

Gordon began turning, between centers, a small dogwood crotch half log with the bark side towards the headstock. After flattening the center side of the log, he formed a tenon, using a 5/8" bowl gouge and a 3/8" spindle gouge. Then he turned the blank around and secured it in a scroll chuck, using the tailstock for support as long as possible.

Now the bark side (the top of the platter) is towards the tailstock. Using a bowl gouge, he removed a lot of material to reduce the blank to about 5/8" thick. He then rounded the edge and laid out with a pencil line where he thought the appropriate place for beads should be. Using a 5/16" beading tool (D-way tools), he cut a bead on the edge of the platter and another one about ½" away from the first one. Between the beads he formed a cove.

Gordon showed a homemade texturing tool and used it to add texture (an orange peel effect) to the cove. He then cut a shallow bowl from the inside bead to the center using a bowl gouge and cleaning it up with a large round scraper.

Normally he would sand the top and edges of the platter at this stage, but he did not want to create dust during the demo. Because removing the tenon during the demo would eliminate the ability to sand the top of the platter, he told how he would reverse the platter, jamming it between the headstock and the tailstock, using something soft on the headstock side that will drive the piece but not scratch it. Then he could finish the back side of the platter and remove the tenon and sand it. The final step would be to use a chisel to remove the little nub that you can't get to because of the tailstock and sand. Gordon finished the piece with Danish oil and buffed it with the Beall buffing wheels.
