Ted Palfrey, Hollowing Thanks for an outstanding demo!



Ted Palfrey is a member of Cookville Woodturners and also SMWTS—watching on ZOOM. His specialty is hollowed forms embellished by piercing, carving, and pyrography. He is an expert at all of these!

Ted emphasized that for turned and hollowed forms, "form is everything".. The Rule of Thirds is vital for attractive form. For instance, a pleasing size might be 6" diameter & 6" high with a 2" foot and a 2" top opening turning a continuous curve from the widest diameter to the foot.

Green wood is his preference for hollowing because it is easier to work. It may or may not require reshaping when it dries. He turns end grain, and emphasized that the tenon is very important in hollowing since there is a lot of stress on the work. He makes it about 10% larger and will re-turn it when dry. Ted keeps the work between centers until he starts to hollow. He shapes the outside to it's finished state because he needs the outside shape to guide the **Tips:** -Use air pressure to hollowing. clean out shavings frequently. -Turn the cutter to negative rake by twisting a little to the left. -To avoid flat spots, he checks the curve by holding a glue stick to it.

—When turned, the vessel will have a 1/2" wall at the opening. —Check the shaping by taking it off the lathe to get a vertical view.

His drying procedure: Dry the vessel for 2-3 months (he uses an old refrigerator with a fan and weighs the piece every 2 weeks. When it is not loosing weight, it is dry. He may use a moisture meter as well. **Re-shaping wall thickness when dry**: 3/8" wall for piercing or carving & 1/4" wall if left plain.

SAFETY MESSAGE Gordon Fowler The 6 laws of Woodturning.

- 1. Adjust lathe speed to match work
- 2. Tool on tool rest before touch the wood
- 3. ABC Anchor, Bevel, Contact
- 4. Support tool on the rest before contacting wood
- 5. Always cut with the grain, therefore downhill. Outside bowl, cut from small diameter to large; Inside bowl, cut from large to small
- 6. Scraper: Don't rub the bevel; keep handle up & flat on tool rest

Plus his #7. Never use a spindle roughing gouge on face grain
